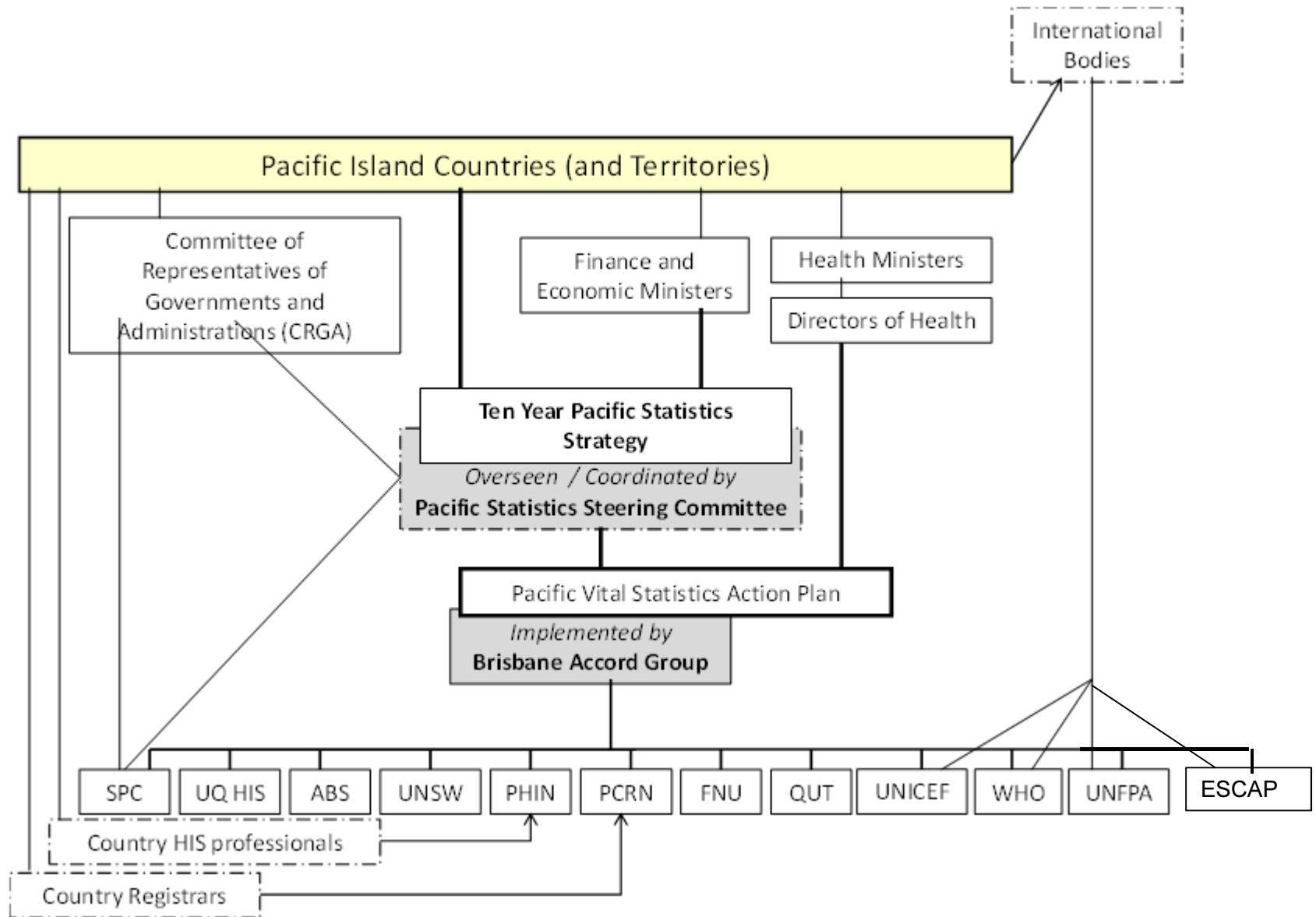


# Pacific Vital Statistics Action Plan

- In place since 2011 – updated on an ongoing basis (last major revision 1<sup>st</sup> qtr 2016)
- Coordinates the activities of the Brisbane Accord Group
- 12 agencies
- Formal agreement in place by partners (10 signatures)
- External reviews support this as an effective coordination mechanism.

# PVSAP Regional Priorities

- Support countries to complete national comprehensive assessments and plans
- Support regional best practice in legislation
- Governance and Accountability
- Encourage appropriate use of IT to support registration
- Develop a sustainable regional capacity in certification training
- Develop regional coding capacity
- Encourage countries to ensure national CRVS systems are adequately resourced
- A greater emphasis on data analysis and accessibility, and subsequently use of data for policy and planning
- Platforms for data dissemination – at both national and regional levels
- Support registry practices for good data management and appropriate data sharing

# Improving through experience – operational research

- Some of the topics and experiences that BAG partners have identified as being important to document include:
  - The use of system mapping to assess CRVS systems in the Pacific
  - Linking CRVS and Education Data (ie Tonga and Vanuatu)
  - Experiences linking CRVS to National Development Strategies
  - The potential uses of automated coding systems in the Pacific
  - Challenges in community engagement for CRVS
- Fiji – experiences in improving cause of death data through certification training, coding and quality audits.
- Links between poverty and access to registration

- Coding and medical records support
- Certification training and support
- Time to write up lessons learned/ best practices
- Resources to fund operational research needs and to translate research outcomes into practice
- Funding support for research
- Ability to support broader community based outreach and media in selected countries.
- Funding to support more country led exchanges and internships

# Ongoing challenges

- Resources
- Country capacity to absorb and integrate TA
- Political engagement for cross-sectoral support for CRVS at the national level.
- Integration of CRVS into national statistics strategies and development plans
- Partner coordination – especially as more agencies move into the area.
